LETTER FROM OUR PASTOR

My Dear Friends,

Sometime ago I volunteered to write a note to all who call St. Andrew's their spiritual home. I have been privileged to worship with you for nearly six months. Sally and I have been fed by the experience of worship each Sunday that we have been with you. We find St Andrew's, although small, to be filled with many dedicated parishioners who not only love God but also are willing to do the many tasks necessary to keep this Parish operating. All of you must be aware that St. Andrew's is in transition and the future of this Parish is uncertain. There is a wonderful prayer that begins with the words, "revive the church" which I am sure is the hope of so many of you. Sometimes we forget the rest of the first line of the prayer is "Lord revive the church beginning with me". Yes my brothers and sisters in Christ the future of St. Andrew's depends upon YOU! As St. Paul has told us there are a variety of gifts and each of us has gifts to offer to the community we call St. Andrew's. None of us can say I have no gifts to offer, for in all honesty St. Andrew's is blessed with an abundance of gifts. St. Paul reminds us that even when we think our gift is insignificant, God can create miracles with them. I am confidant that St. Andrew's will survive and continue to fulfill a vital role in the lives of the parishioners of St. Andrew's.

We believe a successful Parish must have many programs and when a Parish is in decline we attempt to find ways to make our programs stronger. Programs are important but I do not believe they are the

primary concern of God. The primary purpose of any church is to provide a place to worship almighty God and for us to be fed by God through word and sacraments. St. Andrew's should be a place where we experience forgiveness and we are loved in spite of our sins. The power of renewal of any Parish begins with the worship of almighty God. You may be wondrously surprised by what God can do for St. Andrew's if we worship him and have faith in what God can do for this Parish.

When you receive this letter we will be starting our summer worship schedule. Summer is my favorite time to worship because the services are done with simplicity and beauty. I hope to make the services shorter so that we can enjoy the beauty of Gods creation outside the church. However, I realize I have a spiritual hunger that needs to be fed regularly by God. I invite you to come to church as a family and break bread with me as we celebrate the presence of our Lord Jesus Christ in our midst. I pray you have a wonderful and restful summer.

SPECIAL DIOCESAN CONVENTION 13 MARCH 2004

On a beautiful Saturday morning in March Jody Bowes and I had the privilege of attending the Special Convention of the Diocese of Massachusetts which was held at the campus of Boston University in Boston Massachusetts. Jody represented and attended as the liaison from the Music Committee and myself as the alternate delegate to convention.

The focus of the day was on music: music as a tool for evangelism, music as a way to deepen and form our faith, music as a way to enrich and enliven and expand our parish and diocesan worship. The keynote speaker was Dr. Horace Boyer, editor of the 'Lift Every Voice and Sing Hymnal, who in his testament to music's impact on church life —with an energy, spirituality and rhythm led us, and taught us as we sang a number of hymns and service music from that hymnal. Never before have we sung 'Lift every voice and sing' or known of its history as the 'other' National anthem. (Ask us we'll be happy to explain further).

The business of the day – in the afternoon session – was one resolution. Bishop Cederholm introduced the resolution and precluded the discussion period by

reminding us of our connectedness to one another and the importance of listening with care to one another. After discussion and some proposed amendments that were voted down, an overwhelming majority passed the original resolution as follows:

RESOLUTION ON SUPPORT OF SAME SEX CIVIL MARRIAGE Resolved, that this Special Convention of the Diocese of Massachusetts join with its Bishops in affirming its commitment to civil rights by recording its support of the Massachusetts' Supreme Judicial Court's holding in Goodridge v The Department of Public Health, that to deny same-sex couples the right of civil marriage is unconstitutional in their Commonwealth; and be it further

Resolved, that this resolution be communicated by letter to the Governor's Office, the President of the Massachusetts Senate and the Speaker of the Massachusetts House; and be it further

Resolved, that this resolution be announced in a press release; and be it further

Resolved, that the press release be delivered with a cover letter to each Massachusetts senator and representative.


lives are so bleak and who see no way out of the depressing cycle of poverty!

SUMMER SERVICE

June 13th through September 5th Services will be held at Dear Friends and family of St. Andrew's;

Spring started out cold and gray, and there was hardly a sign of life in sight. It's easy to feel just as gray and hopeless as the weather. But sure enough, recent weeks have brought forth the promise of renewed life, as trees have flowered and leafed, the grass has turned green again, and gentler breezes blow. Praise the Lord for his promise of this eternal life, even here on earth!

I want to congratulate all of you who stuck by St. Andrew's through the winter phase of her life. I was just as depressed as many of you. But there's been a change over the past few months, and I see many happier faces, hear less complaining, and feel the spiritual joy coming from the congregation on Sunday. St. Andrew's is on its way to become a place of joyous worship and loving fellowship- a place we can each be fed and nourished. Life holds promise again. It's a wonderful thing! And amazingly enough, the church is surviving. Things are getting done, people are being cared for, and people are volunteering to help out.

As we continue our journey to find a Priest in Charge, or PIC as we call it on the Vestry, we are faced with some tough questions. Because the success of our next rector, and the future of St. Andrew's, all lie in our hands. We can make it work, or we can ensure its failure.

There seems to be agreement that we need some stability and nurturing in order to get to a point where we can focus outside ourselves and develop a purpose and outside ministry. It's going to take time to do that. Clearly Fr. Roy Benjamin has represented the kind of pastor we need, as he has shepherded us through the cold winter of our lives and into the sunshine of real worship and spiritual nourishment.

Fr. Roy is willing to stick with us as supply, but that is not a long-term solution for St. Andrew's. I think that most of you would like to see a more permanent "solution." But each of us should let him know how much we appreciate his presence with us, and obvious love he feels for St. Andrew's, as it continues its progress toward that "solution."

We can afford a part-time priest, and can even afford a couple years of a full-time priest, but it will take a while to find one. And when we do find someone willing to join us on our spiritual journey, there is a very real risk that we'll blow it. As a church we have a terrible history of burying the priest with all of the responsibilities we have individually shouldered, and with the challenge of a vast array of high expectations. Like many other churches of our size, we want to pretend that the priest can and will do everything, and we can pick and choose when or even if we will get involved. Remember, WE are St. Andrew's, not the priest, and the future of St. Andrew's is in our hands. Please take the time to celebrate the gifts the Lord has bestowed on YOU, and look for ways to use them to His glory, and to the life of St. Andrew's.

Again, thank you to those that have stepped up to the task. Keep up the good work. And to those who have not, please take some time to find a functioning place in our congregation. As a leader, or a participant, we need you.
