GREETINGS FROM REV. JOE

Dear Sisters and Brothers of St. Andrew's,

It's a very busy time of preparation for what we each hope will be an exciting and inspirational season. 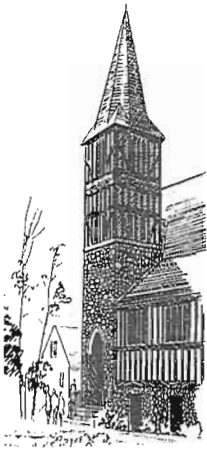
