I was appointed priest-in-charge in January 2007. A priest-in-charge appointment is for three years. During this year, our third year together, it is customary to work with a diocesan facilitator to prayerfully decide if we are called to continue on our faith journey together. There will be more on this later in the year as your vestry and I learn more about the process. Rest assured that everyone will have the opportunity to express their views.

## **FROM OUR SENIOR WARDEN**

Dear Friends,  
Happy Spring! And Belated Happy Earth Day! This year's Earth Day on April 22nd marked the 39th anniversary of the largest international non-secular holiday celebration in the world connecting people of various faiths and socio-economic backgrounds around the central theme of our

environment. Across this great country, folks are changing the way they live and do business to become better stewards of God's creation. The changes run the gamut from changing light bulbs, to recycling, to drinking fair trade coffee to greening our churches, homes and offices. We are pleased to announce that St. Andrew's is plunging into the world of "Going Green." Our first steps are baby ones and likely ones that you have already undertaken in your homes.

We're starting by changing out our light bulbs to energy saving compact fluorescent bulbs. Our sexton, Jeff Coholan, has begun installing the new light bulbs in our sanctuary and the effort will continue throughout our building. Did you know that just one of these compact fluorescent bulbs will save about \$30 over its lifetime and pay for itself in about 6 months? It will also use 75 percent less energy and last about 10 times longer than an incandescent bulb. This change is not only environmentally friendly, but in the end will also prove to be budget friendly.

We are also in the process of joining a community-based paper-recycling program, which will result in the installation of a large green and yellow bin in our parking lot. You may have seen these bins in some of the schoolyards around town. The bin comes at no charge to St. Andrew's and will serve as a collection point for paper recyclables (see elsewhere in this issue for a list of accepted materials). We will then receive a small stipend based on the amount of paper deposited in the bin. Once we are up and running, in addition to being used by the Church and our tenants, our friends and parishioners will also be encouraged to bring their paper recyclables to church to deposit in the bin. More details will follow as we get closer to the installation date, but you may direct any questions you have in the meantime to Len or Bev Brown. We are continuing our efforts to reduce our paper mailings by developing an email list. Accepting electronic delivery of items such as the Grapevine not only saves paper and stamps but the peoplepower and energy required to copy and collate. Since we began this effort over a year ago, we have reduced the number of copies of the Grapevine that we print and mail by 33%. If you have an email address and have not already done so, please consider adding your name to our list. Our Webmaster, Huib Walta, also puts the Grapevine up on our website almost simultaneously with the publication of the paper copy, so you may also access a copy through our website if your mailbox has trouble accommodating large files like the Grapevine.

This is just the beginning of the greening of St. Andrew's and we welcome and value your input, comments and

assistance. Let's jump in, roll up our sleeves and join what Fr. Thomas Berry, the great eco-theologian, calls the "great work" of our time. It is joyous work

### **FROM THE TREASURER**

*Financial Report through April 2009:*

Pledge 2009 – received to date: \$15,478.50 (97% of budgeted to date). We made up significant ground during March and April, thank you! But because of the rough economy, we budgeted less than was actually pledged, so this represents 90% of the amount pledged. We appreciate your keeping your pledges up in difficult times.

Heating fund donations - \$370 in 2009 and \$1516 for the entire heating season – thank you. You helped us get through the end of the season. We should pay our final bills in May.

Income: \$28,479 (76% of budget)  
Expenses: \$36,484 (83% of budget)  
Shortfall: \$ 8,005

No transfers from reserves have yet been made to the account this year. The entire shortfall has come from the checking account balance left at the end of last year. The deficit is slightly larger than last reported. In March, we had a large unplanned expense for the elevator inspection, for which we will have to budget in the future. In April, we brought our payments for payroll taxes and for the assessment up to date.

On a good note, many of you saw the listing in the paper for unclaimed funds at the State Treasurer's office. We are taking the necessary steps to recover it, and when we get it, it will amount to a small windfall of about \$6,000. Unfortunately, even though it is 'found money', technically it does come out of the reserves, and our obligations already claim a good portion of it.

### **COFFEE HOUR**

We need more people to share in the coffee hour ministry. Please consider helping out with this time of fellowship after the 9:30 service by taking a turn to provide cookies or pastries. The sign up sheet is on the door connecting the downstairs parlor and the kitchen.

### **RECOGNITION SUNDAY**

Our annual Recognition Sunday will be held this year on Sunday, May 17th. In addition to celebrating the completion of another Sunday school year by our children, we will be taking this opportunity to honor all of the tireless volunteers whose time and talent make St. Andrew's the special place that it is. Our annual cookout will immediately follow the service. Please be sure to join us for this important celebration.


## ARE YOU INTERESTED IN CONFIRMATION OR FIRST COMMUNION?

As we begin planning for next year's Sunday school program, we are trying to get a handle on whether we have children who might be interested in either First Communion or Confirmation. Our First Communion program is usually for children who are in 2nd grade and above. The children follow a special curriculum through the year and the First Communion service is held in the spring. For Confirmation, the Diocese is now recommending that children be 16 years of age at the time of their Confirmation. Generally, if you are entering 9th grade this coming fall or will turn 16 by the Spring of 2011, you would likely be eligible to begin our two-year program in the fall. In order to make the process as convenient as possible for our older teens and their families, we are going to change the format we have previously followed and anticipate that Confirmation classes would meet once per month on Sunday evenings. Please let us know if you have a child who is interested in either of these programs by leaving a message in the church office, or by speaking with Rev. Joe.

## INTRODUCING ONE OF OUR NEW VESTRY MEMBERS

# What Goes in the Paper Retriever® Bin

## Yes, Please.....

**Newspaper and Inserts** – New newsprint can be made from 100% recycled paper. No virgin fiber has to be added when using this type of process.

**Magazines/catalogs** – Our Retriever program is happy to take magazines and catalogs, all slick paper. We can use all this high quality/high fiber paper with the exception of any paper coated in wax.

**Office/School papers** – These types of paper are highly recyclable. Because of the proliferation of paper created by offices and schools, please use the Retriever bin to recycle all that you can. We are able to accept window envelopes, paperback books, workbooks and staples without a problem. Shredded paper is acceptable but please bag the shreds before putting them in the Retriever bin. However, please do not recycle colored paper, wrapping or tissue paper, carbon paper or sticky notes.

**Mail** – Most direct mail is printed on high quality recyclable paper. Please recycle the mail that you feel comfortable putting in our recycling bin.

## No, Thanks.....

**No Cardboard** – We do not accept cardboard in any of our Retriever bins. We supply our mills with the recycled fiber we collect through the Retriever program to create new newsprint. Cardboard should not be used in making newsprint due to the excessive bleaching required.

However, cardboard is a valuable recycling commodity and should be recycled. Please research cardboard recycling options in your area.

**No food boxes, fiberboard or chipboard.** Cereal boxes, soda boxes and other paper food containers should be recycled with your cardboard. Please do not put these in the Retriever bin.

**No textbooks or hard cover books.** We do not have the equipment to modify these types of recyclables in the Retriever system. Please research other options for recycling these items.

**No Phone Books** – We do not accept phone books in our Retriever bins. We supply our mills with the recycled fiber we collect through the Retriever program to create new newsprint. Phone Books cannot be used in making newsprint. The fibers in the pages of the phone book are in their smallest form and do not contribute to the fiber needed for newsprint. Also, it is very hard to remove the ink from a phone book page.

However, phone books are a valuable recycling commodity and should be recycled in the proper capacity. Please research phone book recycling options in your area.
