FROM THE SENIOR WARDEN

Dear Friends,

I had planned to write what you would probably all think of as a traditional new year message for our first Grapevine of 2010, but as John Lennon once said "life is what happens while you're busy making other plans" and I am instead going to share with you some thoughts on Len Brown. As you all know, Len and I were the wardens here at St. Andrew's. What you may not know is that it was only because Len committed to yet another stint as our Junior Warden that I agreed to become the Senior Warden. Len was my friend, my mentor, my supporter, my inspiration, my collaborator, my Vestry colleague, a role model for my son and at the epicenter of our church family. Len and I shared a great love for St. Andrew's. We spent a lot of time together over the past few years, working on projects both big and small, as well as

brainstorming on how we might make this a better place. I was good at the big picture and he was even better at bringing the vision to life and attending to the smallest details that I, quite frankly, didn't even know existed. It didn't matter what I wanted or needed. If I put out the call, I knew he would answer -- teaching Sunday school last vear when we were short of teachers, acting as a mentor for confirmands, remodeling the rectory, setting up a Halloween party, arranging flowers for my mom's funeral, or overseeing the exterior restoration of our church. During the week, we'd often be sitting around the office and I'd say to him "you know what we ought to do" or "wouldn't it be great if we could" or "why don't we" and before I knew it he'd be taking care of whatever I had on my mind. The Friday night before Len died we were here at the church helping to wrap gifts for children who live in the Arlington Neighborhood. We were about 3/4 of the way into the evening when I leaned over and said to him "we should have had our recycling bin out here tonight." Next thing I knew, out of the corner of my eye, I saw him bringing the bin into the hall. Two summers ago we were in the position of having an apartment on our hands that needed some extensive renovations to get it into tenant worthy condition. The church desperately needed the income that the apartment would generate, so I put out the call one Sunday morning in church and, predictably, Len and Bev were the first volunteers. Other volunteers floated in and out of the project, but Len and Bev and I stayed it through to the end. I often joked about how other people went to the Cape or Islands for summer vacation, but mine was spent at 7 Messer Ave with the Browns. What a gift it was to have spent that summer with them. Sometimes the projects were much simpler. We were doing a tea here one spring to raise money for our Diocese's mission work in the Gulf. I was struggling to hang little white lights in the windows in the hall when Len stopped in to see how he could help. He transformed my ineffective attempt at artistry into a twinkling, magical fairyland. He was literally a guy who could hang 99 cent plastic tablecloths in our windows and make them look like custom made draperies. We don't really know the extent to which Len handled things around here and, as a layleader, I'm almost afraid to go there. This much I do know though. Len would want us to continue to work on making our church, our neighborhood and our community a better, more beautiful place. So although life has gotten in the way and none of this is what we had planned, I will continue to work on all of things that were important to Len. I hope you will all consider doing the same. That's probably not such a bad thought for the new year after all.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING UPDATE

GLC, the consultant who have studied affordable housing options for the City of Methuen, submitted its report outlining the feasibility of an affordable housing option at St. Andrew's. Rev. Joe, Len, Janet and I met to discuss next steps, and agreed that the members of the parish might not have enough information to make an informed decision. We agreed to a structured process of discernment that would, hopefully, answer questions and get us, as a church, to a point where we could make an informed decision as to the future of the project.

I met with Charlie Wibiralske from Episcopal City Mission (from whom we received the two grants to study feasibility) to enlist his assistance. We agreed to a process and timeline that might look like the following:

January- Planning meeting with Rev. Joe, Janet, Charlie and I; initial meeting with Bishop Tom to outline process so far

February- Meeting after 9:30 service to reflect on process and articulate questions that need to be answered; Local field trip after the 9:30 service to visit an affordable housing development (see it first hand) to be followed by parish wide discussion.

March- Presentation by a management company to hear about what is involved in being a neighbor and partner in a development and ask questions; Presentation from tenants of affordable housing to hear about why it is important and what kind of difference it has made in their life to be followed by parish wide discussion

April- Field trip to visit a church that is currently doing affordable housing to hear benefits, pitfalls, lessons learned; Meeting after 9:30 service to reflect on discernment process and determine whether questions have been answered

Mid May- Meeting after 9:30 service to take a Go/No Go vote of the parish

If "Go, "→ June- Bring vote to the Standing Committee for their concurrence

Summer- Develop RFP to select developer→ complete engineering studies→ create plan→ bring to Community Development and Zoning→ present to Diocesan Standing Committee for approval
