That budget becomes the blueprint by which we operate the business of St. Andrew's. What, you may ask, does your prayerful consideration of your pledge have to do with any of this? It means that you have thought about it, prayed about it, and had a conversation with God about It means that you have concluded that St. Andrew's is important to you and that you want to support this faith community and its ministries. It means you have

come up with an amount that you can realistically commit to St. Andrew's during 2014. you to change your commitment, we can make whatever adjustments are necessary on our end. It's as simple as sending a note or making a phone call to our pledge recorder, Elaine Morissette.

Money is not an easy thing to talk about, although I'll admit that with 5 stewardship campaigns under my belt it has become easier. Thank you for bearing with me and please know that we are grateful for each and every gift of your time, talent and treasure.

STEWARDSHIP LETTER

October 23, 2013

Dear St. Andrew's Family:

It's that time of year when we must once again talk about stewardship. Stewardship is not simply about money. It is about how we live and how we give. It is about giving of our time, talent and treasure in response to God's gifts of unconditional love, salvation and grace. For many of us here at St. Andrew's, giving of our time and talent comes almost as second nature. We are blessed with many volunteers who perform in a variety of ways to keep us going. Giving of our treasure is more difficult for many of us.

St. Andrew's depends on the voluntary offerings of the parish to maintain the facilities, pay the staff and carry out the programs of the parish. Your contribution, large or small, helps keep the parish going.

- The total 2013 budgeted expenses are \$119,636 or \$328 per day.
- Our Music Program costs \$10,250 per year. That's \$197 per week.
- Utilities cost \$18,500 per year in the church building and another \$8100 per year in the rectory.
- Part-time staff expenses are \$17,709.
- The average of the 52 pledges we received for 2013 is \$52,468 annually or \$1009 per week. That translates into an average weekly pledge of \$19.
- The top 5 pledges average \$331 per week (or an average of \$66 per pledge).
- The remaining 49 pledges average \$678 per week (or an average of \$14 per pledge).


In order to responsibly and realistically plan for the financial needs of the Parish for the coming year, we rely on members making a well considered "pledge" of financial support. Later this year we will develop a budget for the upcoming year for Vestry approval. During the budget-making process, the plans and goals for the year are balanced against expected income. Since pledges account for roughly half of our budgeted operating income, your pledge is an important building block for next year's budget and extremely important!

A pledge is your commitment of a certain amount of money to help this community grow. St. Andrew's is our spiritual home, and your pledge helps us extend that welcome to others. Your pledge to St. Andrew's says, "I am a part of this community, and I want to show that this parish that its goals are important to me."

Pledges are most useful when made as year-long commitments, and we encourage you to make your pledge for 2014 by November 17, 2013. Most people fulfill their pledges in weekly or monthly installments throughout the year. When you declare your pledge commitment early, it helps us to plan and to allocate for our full range of ministries, both local and global, for the full year.

Many people feel deeply rewarded when the way they choose to live and give includes committing to an intentional program of giving to their church. It is a sort of spiritual discipline that helps them feel closer to God, and more closely linked to this community, its activities and ministries. We hope you will make your pledge to St. Andrew's and experience a similar reward.

ADULT EDUCATION FOR ADVENT DECEMBER 15, 2013

Advent is a season of looking forward to the celebration of the birth at Christ at Christmas. The prophets are an important part of that looking forward. Some of them prophesied the birth and sacrifice of Jesus; others exhorted their people to return to the Lord. These prophesies show up in the Advent liturgy and also play



an important part in our Lessons and Carols Service, which will be held the prior Sunday. Please plan to join us after church on Sunday, December 15, to study the prophets. We will learn about and discuss their messages for their own times, and how those messages are relevant for us today.

EUCHARISTIC MINISTERS AND VISITORS

Please remember that the office is only staffed part-time, so the response may take a little while.

MERRIMACK VALLEY DEANERY

The Merrimack Valley Deanery includes parishes stretching from Westford to Newburyport. We are fortunate to be located in the center, so we do not have to travel that far. The deanery meetings for this year are being held at Trinity Church in Haverhill. The last meeting was held September 25. At that meeting, a youth candidate was selected for the upcoming Diocesan convention. At the May meeting, grants totaling \$6300 were awarded to four parishes for outreach activities. At the meetings we are also made aware of upcoming events at parishes in the deanery and at the Diocesan level. I will post these on the bulletin board on the lower level. At the last meeting we also had a presentation on the efforts of a several parishes who are trying to establish collaborative activities for mission, administration, and

for worship. That is something we may look into as well. We have two deanery representatives, but anyone from the parish can attend. The next meeting will be in the spring. If you are interested (a participatory supper is provided), please see Jim Beagan or Betty MacKay.

TOGETHER NOW CAPITAL CAMPAIGN UPDATE

I've asked Craig Seaman, our Organist, and also the person from Andover Organ responsible for the restoration, to describe for us (in layman's terms)

what's happening as a result of this restoration effort. He has written several great articles for the Grapevine about the organ, and I asked him for a progress report.

He reports that, with respect to the overall project, we have completed phase 1, which addressed the most pressing issue of cyphers (pipes that do not stop playing). Phase 2 and 3, which are scheduled for next Spring 2014 after Easter, will make the organ easier to play. Phases 4 and 5, which are not yet scheduled, will clean up the voicing and regulation of the pipes themselves

(i.e. make the pipes sound better).

This organ has "trackerpneumatic" action. A "tracker" is a mechanical linkage between the key

and wind chest that "tracks" the movement of the key. "Pneumatic" means pressurized air, and in this organ involves thin leather which flexes when operat-

ing, valves made of felt & leather that seal against the hole to the pipe, and gaskets which must completely seal the internal workings against the outside atmosphere. All of these components wear over time and need to be periodically refurbished for the organ to continue working optimally.

On November 24, after church, Craig will give a short talk (20 – 30 minutes) that will explain the

workings of this organ, and the specific projects we are undertaking.

Thank you to everyone for keeping up your pledges. Remember that our bright, beautiful, warm Parish Hall is now advertised as available for rentals on the parish website, complete with some photos. Keep us in mind if you know of people looking for a venue for 160 or fewer people.

Again, thank you to our pledgers to the Capital Campaign! You have made all of this work possible, and with your help, we will get another 100 years out of our beautiful organ and make some great memories in our Parish Hall.
