It is a delicate balance, and one that the Vestry tries hard to maintain.

So, this fall, as we look ahead at our "new year", I ask you to think about your ministry here at St. Andrew's. Is there something you would like to do, to join in with, to help with, or to accomplish? Do you want to help, but don't know where to start? Talk to Fr. Joe. me. or another member of the Vestry, if you are looking for a way to fulfill a role in our parish life. FROM THE ORGAN BENCH

Parish Hymnbook project

Congregational singing is an important part of the worship experience at St. Andrew's, and there are many wonderful hymns in our two hymnals - The Hymnal 1982, and Wonder, Love and Praise. During our summer hymn sings there are usually about 10 hymns selected, some which we have sung recently, and others which have been used less frequently. The hymns selected this summer will be used during a worship service in the fall, starting with "Welcome Back Sunday" and continuing until "Christ the King".



But there are also many equally wonderful hymns that are not in our hymnals, either because they were not selected at the time of publication, or they were written after the hymnals were published. I have used bulletin inserts for different hymn texts that I have found. But the inserts need to be prepared for the bulletin, and then collected afterwards, and so are a little bit awkward to use.

So I have decided to develop a parish hymnbook, which would be kept in the pews in mini-binders that hold half-sheet pages (5 $\frac{1}{2}$ by 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches). These binders would allow us to add hymns at any time, and all of these hymns would be readily available for regular worship services, as well as during hymn sings. There have already been two requests for hymns to include - How Great Thou Art, and In the Garden. Please let me know if you have any other favorite hymns to include in our hymnbook.

STEWARDSHIP 2016

Each fall, we put away our summer dreams and get back to work. This extends to our church life too. Our children come back to church school. We re-commit to our community worship at welcome back Sunday. We also re-commit to our parish home through the stewardship program.

In the past two years, the stewardship committee has asked for volunteers to speak about the readings provided under the series Walking the Way (2014) and God the Giver (2015). We were blessed to have had testimony from several of your fellow parishioners who told about their faith journeys and how it is manifest in their stewardship.

This year's theme is Living Generously. Rather than seek speakers this year, we invite every one of our parish community to remember the lessons of the past, to walk the way and to think about how God has given to you, and then apply them to this year's theme and how you respond by living generously. Each reading ties to the gospel of the day and has questions for you to reflect on.

Each Sunday, the bulletin inserts will include both the current reading, and the next week's reading. Please read the next week's reading and think about the questions on it. Each Sunday, starting October 9, following the gospel and the rector's brief reflection on that, we will have the lector read the current Living Generously selection. After that, we will take time to ask you for your responses to the reading and the questions. There is no need to prepare a sermon or lecture, just share with us a thought or two that answers how the question moved you to think about your relation to God in your life, and how that may tie into your being generous in all aspects of your life: your family, your home, your community, your job, and especially your parish..

The date for return of pledge cards will be November 13. They will be available in church before that date, and will be included in the November grapevine. We will follow that date with a celebration of thanksgiving to God as part of our liturgy on the last Sunday of the church year, the feast of Christ the King, November 20, the Sunday before Thanksgiving.

Stewardship is about how we all share to build the community of the faithful. Although the end result is on financial contributions, that is never just what we focus on. The focus is how you share your time, talents and treasure. We want to use this year's stewardship program to have you share your thoughts and prayers as well. After all, aren't those what guide how you use your time and talents, and are therefore the essence of your treasure, and our parish's collective treasure?

SAFE CHURCH TRAINING

This year St. Andrew's will be offering training in "Safe Church" practices, and encouraging all of our church leadership to complete this training. Last fall four of our members attended an all-day/in-person training at Grace Church in Lawrence. Now it is time to move forward with a second phase of training, offering on-line, and supported on-line training to our parish leadership and/or anyone in the church who works in a position of responsibility.

Safe Church training is designed to increase awareness regarding sexual misconduct and abuse of power, to outline steps toward preventing abuse, to offer ways to intervene when misconduct occurs and to equip anyone in a position of parish leadership with ways of healing and rebuilding the body of Christ.

The training is required of all clergy, and highly recommended for wardens, vestry members, lay eucharistic visitors, pastoral visitors, youth leaders, Confirmation sponsors, acolyte leaders, choir directors, church school teachers and volunteers working in a congregation on a regular basis.

The Episcopal Diocese of Massachusetts offers two types of Safe Church Training: in-person group training and online training. While much of the same essential material is covered by each, please review the details below to choose which one best fits your needs.

In-person group training:

- Strongly recommended due to its broad scope and the group experience of sharing stories, ideas, methods and policies
- Offered at different churches throughout the diocese several times a year
- Runs on Saturdays from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. (must attend entire session to receive certification)

- Costs \$40 and includes lunch. Scholarships are available; no one will be turned away due to cost.
- Participants receive a binder of materials and resources.

Online training:

- Has four required modules of video, text and interactive questions that take 30-45 minutes each
- No cost (offered through the diocese's partnership with Church Pension Group)
- Participants will be issued a unique user name and passwords for to access the training website. The training is always accessible from any computer with a high-speed Internet connection so you can do the training at any time, at your own speed.
- *Participants must successfully complete online test based on the training modules in order to receive certificate.

Supported On-line training:

St. Andrew's is offering a combination of these two styles of training, which will be held this winter in the Church Hall. We will view the on-line modules, discuss the concepts covered, and make laptops available so that you may take the test and complete your certification that day. You will get written materials. With this method you can get support from others, and help with using the computer modules. Especially good for those who are not comfortable using the computer or those who do not have computer access at home.
